"RECTITUDE IS PERPETUAL VICTORY"

MOBILITY OF TRAGEDY

It is one of those signs of a decaying civilization which abound today when men lose the sense of tragedy and become incapable even of imagining the deepest experience of woe. There are few more disconcerting indices to the spiritual & moral conditions of our generation than the absence in its literature of great tragedy. Let us not be misunderstood. More pathos is not tragedy. Supreme misfortune does not of necessity constitute tragedy. Even the bloodshed of a world-wide war may not deserve this term. For tragedy demands nobility in the sufferer. The cynic is incapable of it. The small-minded selfish cannot experience it. The materialist has dulled the faculties that would make him capable of entering into this mystery. The tragic stage demands a religious background, and it is found only where the religious sense is alive. When man denies his relations to the heavens and conceives of himself as only a superior animal, when he refuses to affirm divine purpose in the Universe, and sees in history only the play of blind forces, he thereby destroys the possibility in literature of great tragedy. A Catholic poet of our own time, Mr. Alfred Noyes, has painted out how intimate is the connection between religious and this type of drama. "Great tragedy is the destruction of a far meaningless annihilation. There is no tragedy in the destruction of a fortuitous concourse. Great tragedy is an affirmation of spiritual values--the supreme symbol of tragedy is the cross and it holds the secret, not only of humiliation, pain, defeat and death, but of spiritual resurrection and the entering into eternal life....."

Cut the bread in narrow strips and remove all crusts. Toast to a golden brown. While hot, spread with creamed butter to which the vanilla has been added. Sprinkle with the sugar mixed with cinnamon. Put in oven until sugar is melted.
